Waterworld by Max Allan Collins




Deep Secret by Berlie Doherty

Valley of Gold by Jackie French



ANIMAL CONSERVATION

The Last Whales by Lloyd Abbey

Gradually their life together for the blue whales becomes threatened by the bull's instinctual terror of the foreign southern seas. Their descendants are destined never to know the freedom of the oceans, but rather to experience a world of tragedy and destruction in oceans poisoned by radiation and warmed by the greenhouse effect.



Under No Flag by Simon Higgins

The intrepid crew of the rogue submarine, Thunderfish, face a terrible responsibility. Cornered by the navy after a campaign against illegal whalers, Captain Kira Beaumont has been forced to accept a dangerous secret mission, turning her military-trained crew and hitech sub into pawns in a volatile international drama.





Walk with a Wolf by Janni Howker

Once wolves roamed nearly all the lands of the northern hemisphere, but they have been hunted and killed by humans for centuries, and today they are extinct or very rare in places where lots of people live.

A Matter of Cats by Elizabeth Hutchins

The rescue of Grunt, an injured koala, changes Kate's boring old routine.

Kristie's friendship and her father's wildlife sanctuary throw a new light on cats. She meets the media and saves her pet from deadly peril.

Papio by Victor Kelleher

It seems simple enough to David and Jem to release the two baboons from the experimental research station where they are doomed to die. When they discover the baboons are no longer capable of looking after themselves in the African bush, David and Jem are forced to stay and protect them.

Rhino Fire by Elizabeth Laird

As the animal charges away from the speeding helicopter, Titus leans perilously out to take aim with his long dart gun. If only the rare black rhino can be relocated to a new reserve, Afra and Joseph know it might join the few others of its kind. At Nakuru the rhino faces a far greater danger. Battle for the Badgers by Anthony Masters

Sad Song of the Whale by Anthony Masters

Tim leaps at the chance to join Green Watch on an anti-whaling expedition in the Falklands; however, events don't turn out quite as he expected.

Dolphin's Revenge by Anthony Masters

The members of Green Watch are convinced that Sam Jefferson is mistreating the dolphins in his dolphinarium - but they need proof. Frustrated by their failure to uncover any incriminating evidence, Tim decides to take action, and finds himself on the wrong side of the law!






This Morning I Met a Whale by Michael Morpurgo




Storm Boy by Colin Thiele


Escape to Kalimantan by Steve Tolbert

Mang the Wild Orangutan by Joan Van Loon Picture Book




Wombat Warriors by Samantha Wheeler




AUSTRALIAN LANDSCAPE

This book is an introduction to understanding colour theory with brilliant images of a coral reef ecosystem. Both educational and timeless in their environmental message.


Neptune's Nursery *by* Kim Michelle Toft, Allan Sheather

The Sea, the Storm, and the Mangrove Tangle by Lynne Cherry A seed is jostled from a branch of a mangrove tree and floats to a lagoon in the Caribbean Sea. It takes root, sprouts leaves, and slowly begins to grow. Over many years, the mangrove will provide a home and nourishment for numerous creatures of land and sea. Among its roots come to live fiddler crabs and shrimp; in its branches dwell lizards and hummingbirds. Soon the tree is dropping seeds of its own, and other mangroves are growing, creating a tangle whose benefits

extend even to large mammals like dolphins and manatees. Ever threatened by hurricanes and even more by human destruction, the mangroves of our planet are endangered. A look into a unique ecosystem, one that is endangered in many places.

Mangrove by Glenda Kane and Lisa Allen



Wetlands by Tricia Oktober










The Mangrove Tree: Planting Trees to Feed Families by Cindy Trumbore

Every year, green sea turtles swim through the deep waters of the




SEASONS




Where the Forest Meets the Sea by Jeannie Baker


Uno's Garden by Graeme Base
