




Through the smoke by Phil Cummings, Andrew McLean (Illustrator), 2019 Picture Book

Fire by Jackie French, Bruce Whatley (Illustrator), 2014 Picture Book




Fabish: The Horse that Braved a Bushfire by

Neridah McMullin, Andrew McLean (Illustrator), 2016 Picture Book


Based on the true story of a horse called Fabish, who saved a group of young horses during the Black Saturday bushfires.



One hot summer day, a wild wind blew up and Fabish smelled smoke. Fire was coming, fast. The trainer threw open the gate, Fabish neighed to the young ones and they galloped away. All through the night, the fire raged, and the trainer battled to save the racehorses in the stables. But what would become of Fabish and the yearlings? Could he save them from the firestorm?






I began as a tiny spark in the dry grass. All I wanted was a friend. I found one in the wind, who helped me grow, who helped me fly! In the end, though, was the wind really my friend at all? Andrew Plant has always loved the Australian bush and painting it and the animals that live in it. He was 20 km from the Black Saturday bushfires, but remembers the taste of ash in the thick, hazy air, and seeing the glow that night in the sky.




Bushfire Rescue: Extreme Adventures by Justin D'Ath, 2005


47 Degrees by Justin D'Ath, 2019

Zeelie wonders if they're in danger. When temperatures soar to 47 degrees one hot summer day, 12-year-old Zeelie hopes the nearby bushfires everyone's talking about aren't heading towards her family's new home. What will they do if the wind changes direction? What about their belongings and their beloved pets?



Where There's Smoke by John Heffernan, 2010

There's smoke over the hills, but nobody in Edenville seems too concerned, even though it's fire season and the bush is tinder-dry. Luke has made friends in this town, his mum has found a job she likes, and it's starting to look as if they'll stay for a while. But Luke knows that good things don't last, and everything he has come to rely on is threatened by a much bigger event, one that could destroy everyone and everything.



Firestorm! by Roger Vaughan Carr, 1985

The Ash Wednesday bushfires were a series of bushfires that occurred in south-eastern Australia on 16 February 1983, which just happened to be Ash Wednesday and thus were named as such. This story is written from the author's first-hand experience of these Ash Wednesday fires.



But it is early February 2009, and the Black Saturday bushfire is about to encircle Amy and her family and teach Amy first-hand about tragedy and survival.


Ash Road by Ivan Southall 2013

This action-packed adventure story is so evocative of rural Australia you can taste the eucalyptus. It's hot, dry and sweaty on Ash Road, where Graham, Harry and Wallace are getting their first taste of independence, camping, just the three of them. When they accidentally light a bushfire no one would have guessed how far it would go. All along Ash Road fathers go off to fight the fires and mothers help in the first aid centres. The children of Prescott are left alone, presumed safe, until it's the fire itself that reaches them. These children are forced to face a major crisis with only each other and the two old men left in their care.

Teacher's Notes



It's Ash Wednesday, 16 February 1983. The hills around Adelaide, Australia are ablaze. Bushfires are destroying property, houses, lives. In the days to come, one young family will discover just how much they have lost.



February Dragon by Colin Thiele, 2005

Australia in February is high intensity bushfire season and the lives of three Australian children are cruelly affected when a bushfire known as the February Dragon sweeps across the countryside. It disrupts the lives of the Pine family of Upper, Gumbowie, a township halfway between Melbourne and Adelaide.


Water Witcher by Jan Ormerod, 2006 Picture Book










Mallee Sky by Jodi Toering, Tannya Harricks (Illustrator), 2019 Picture Book



Out of the Dust by Karen Hesse, 1997



Fighting against the elements on their Oklahoma farm, Billie Jo takes on even more responsibilities when her mother dies in a tragic accident and her father suffers crippling depression. Shaozhen by Wai Chim, 2017


Through My Eyes: Natural Disaster Zones Series

The worst drought in over sixty years threatens the crops that the entire village relies on for income. As the water situation becomes dire, Shaozhen realises he must come up with a plan. 

The Bobbling and the Flood by Inger Brown, 2018 Picture Book



Freddy the Frogcaster and his friends are hoping for rain. Their town of Lilypad is dry, and plants and trees are brown because of a terrible drought. Freddy gets excited as he sees a storm coming that could bring water to thirsty trees and grass. He leaps into action to warn everyone to be prepared. Suddenly there's a change in the forecast that could affect everyone's plans--and make Freddy wonder if he's meant to be a frogcaster. The fifth title in this series, Freddy the Frogcaster and the Flash Flood, explains droughts, storms, floods, and flash floods, and encourages kids of all ages to be weather ready, just like our friend Freddy.



Cyclone by Jackie French, Bruce Whatley (Illustrator), 2018 Picture Book

Christmas Eve 1974 is marked indelibly into the Australian psyche, as the night tropical Cyclone Tracy devastated and flooded the city of Darwin.


Now, over 40 years later, Jackie French's lyrical rhyming text tells the story of a city's indomitable spirit, and Bruce Whatley's sumptuous illustrations bring to life the powerful force of the storm to a whole new generation of readers.



Flood by Jackie French, Bruce Whatley (Illustrator), 2011 Picture Book

The rain stopped, but the wall of water surged into the river. Hour by hour the river rose. In some places water only nibbled at the banks, but in others it burst across the riverbends ... up into the streets. It sounded like a helicopter. It sounded like a flood.

Inspired by the Queensland floods, this is the story of a natural disaster as seen through the honest eyes of a cattle dog that has been separated from his family. The floodwater mercilessly rips through the towns, and finally recedes, leaving a devastating widespread path of destruction. But from the ruins, courage and kindness emerge. A tiny tugboat heroically guides a wayward boardwalk out to sea; rescuers pluck friends and strangers from the dangerous waters; communities gather, providing aid, shelter, comfort and — above all — hope.



As the mighty Limpopo River bursts its banks and with her husband away working, Josette, who is about to have her next baby, is forced to shelter with her children in the huge milkwood tree near their village. They cling for their lives, above the swirling waters, for three days. It is not until the fourth day that help arrives and a miracle occurs. This touching story of bravery, love and new life is based on a real incident that occurred during the devastating floods in Mozambique in 2000.

Flood by Gillian McClure, 2014 Picture Book


Three animals – two of whom are arch-enemies, the third merely disgruntled – are thrown together in a flood. Finding unexpected skills like steering, swimming and hanging on, they finally reach a small hillock and scramble onto it to wait for the water to subside, while contemplating their newfound reliance on one another.


Elmer and the Flood by David McKee, 2015 Picture Book


Rain or no rain, Elmer is going for a walk. After being cooped up in a cave with his herd, he longs for a bit of fresh air and some peace

and quiet. But peace and quiet is going to have to wait – when Elmer goes outside, he discovers the rain has caused a flood......_Can brave Elmer work out a way to save a stranded young elephant?









Frog is a Hero by Max Velthuijs, 2013

Frog Series Picture Book

Delighted at first, when it begins to rain, Frog eventually finds that even a water-loving amphibian like himself can get too much of a good thing when the river floods, and his house is inundated. Seeking shelter at Duck's house, and then Pig's, and finally ending up all together at Hare's island home, as the waters rise, the friends are inconvenienced, but not endangered. Until, that is, the day the food runs out, and Frog decides that, as the best swimmer, he must go for help...



Flood by Alvaro F. Villa , 2013 Picture Book

This is a wordless picture book which shows the preparation of a family for an impending storm, how they evacuate and what happens when their house is flooded. It also shows how the family pull together on their return to restore their house to order, and life resumes. This intense, beautiful look at a flood's effect on a family carries a simple message of hope and recovery.


Grimsdon by Deborah Abela, 2019

Grimsdon is in ruins. Three years ago, a massive wave broke its barriers and the sea flooded this grand city. Most were saved, some were lost - and some were left behind. Isabella Charm and her best friend, Griffin, live with three other children in the top of an opulent mansion. They've survived with the help of Griffin's brilliant inventions, Isabella's fighting skills and their vow to look after each other. But what will happen when a newcomer arrives in his flying machine? A thrilling novel set in a post-apocalyptic, flooded world. For Ages: 9 - 11 years.




Taken at the Flood by Ken Catran, 2001

Because everything they know has been taken at the flood. And only the strongest will live.



Angel by Zoe Daniel, 2018 Through My Eyes: Natural Disaster Zones Series

Angel's family has seen many typhoons. For generations they've passed across the central Philippines around November, bringing with them drenching rains and strong winds and flooding. Lately they seem to be stronger, more destructive, but Angel and her family and their neighbours know how to batten down for big storms. It's part of their way of life. But when the biggest typhoon of all comes to Tacloban, Angel faces the biggest challenge of her life ... An engaging and suspenseful story about one girl surviving Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines in 2013.





Weather Eye by Lesley Howarth, 1995

Telly Craven is a Weather Eye, part of a club that shares information by computer about climatic conditions around the world. And, as 1999 ends, weird things are happening: floods, earthquakes, force ten gales. It's during such a storm that Telly has a Near Death Experience, leaving her with strange psychic powers.

The Big Flood by Rebecca Johnson, 2016

Juliet, Nearly a Vet Series: Book 11

Hi! I'm Juliet. I'm ten years old. And I'm nearly a vet! It's been raining for days and the farms and paddocks near our house are flooded. Luckily, Chelsea and I are all ready to help when Mum is called out to deal with some stranded alpacas. A vet must be ready to go at a moment's notice! But there are also many small animals that need rescuing. Can we convince Dad to take us out in the canoe before the water rises further? For Ages: 6 - 9 years




Cyclone Tracy: The Diary of Ryan Turner, Darwin,
