
Dingo: The Dog Who Conquered a Continent

All of Australia's dingoes may be descended from one south-east Asian 'rubbish dog' who arrived here over 5,000 years ago. This is a story about the first dingo.

It is also the story of Loa, who heads off across the sea in his canoe when the girl he loves marries another. He takes only his spears and a 'rubbish dog', one of the scavengers from around the camp to eat if he gets hungry, or to throw to threatening sharks or crocodiles. But when a storm blows boy and dog out to sea, both must learn to survive in a

strange new world as partners - and even as friends. A story about survival in our earliest times.









The Donkey Who Carried the Wounded

by Jackie French 2010

War is not the adventure Jack Simpson expected. Carrying a wounded soldier down to the beach of the Gallipoli Peninsula on his shoulders, Jack finds a donkey who miraculously survived being thrown overboard as the troop ships sailed away. Jack and the donkey form a partnership that will become the basis of a major event in Australian history, the rescuing of some 300 injured soldiers in war. Based on a true story this book examines the remarkable life of the man and the donkey, Duffy, who became a legend of Gallipoli.

Spud Series

by John Heffernan 1997

Spud the pet. Spud the companion. Spud the working dog. Spud the mother. Spud the hunted. This dramatic and compelling tale of a blue heeler will touch the hearts of all readers. A vivid portrayal of the life of a working dog in the bush written from the author's first-hand experience. Spud is John Heffernan's own loyal companion on his property in northern New South Wales and was the inspiration for this story. Also in this series Chips 2003, and Pup 2015. Tissues required!

Bindi Irwin's Wildlife Adventure Series

A fast-paced adventure series featuring the Jungle Girl herself. The stories are inspired and co-created by Bindi Irwin, daughter of the iconic wildlife expert Steve Irwin. The series features the characters of Bindi, her brother Robert, mother Terri, and Australia Zoo.

The Magic Pudding

by Norman Lindsay, 1918

This comic fantasy follows the adventures of Bunyip Bluegum and friends Sam Swanoff and Bill Barnacle. Combining humans with anthropomorphic animals, the companions meet a magic pudding – no matter how much or how often you eat him, he will magically reappear as his original size – who they must defend against the Pudding Thieves. With short songs interspersed throughout, the book is divided into four 'slices' instead of chapters – just in case you weren't hungry enough! An iconic classic of Australian children's literature.











The Horses Didn't Come Home

by Pamela Rushby 2012

The last great cavalry charge in history took place at Beersheba in the Sinai Desert in 1917. It was Australian soldiers and horses that took part in, and won, this amazing, unexpected, unorthodox victory. The men proudly claimed it was their great-hearted horses, Queensland Walers, that won the day. But in the end, the horses didn't come home ... A story about a boy, a horse and the last great cavalry charge in history.

Storm Boy

by Colin Thiele 2004 Book and Film

Mike (Storm Boy) is an 11-year-old boy living with his dad near a wildlife sanctuary in the Coorong, South Australia, which is a haven for bird life. When he meets Fingerbone Bill, Mike's eyes are opened to his surroundings, as he learns about the land, the sea and the Aboriginal people. However, it is his unique friendship with a wild pelican that will change his life forever. Mike and Mr Percival the

pelican become inseparable friends and spend their days exploring the wave-beaten shore and the drifting sandhills. A classic work of Australian children's literature.

Wedgetail



Blinky Bill


by Dorothy Wall 1933, 2019 Book and Film

One of the best-known and best-loved characters to ever appear in Australian children's fiction is the mischievous little koala known as Blinky Bill. This anthropomorphic koala first appeared in his self-titled book <u>Blinky Bill</u>, and quickly gained a devoted following. Following this success, Blinky Bill Grows Up (1935) and Blinky Bill and Nutsy (1938) quickly followed, and the popular omnibus edition, The Complete Adventures of Blinky Bill, was published in 1939 and has never been out of print since. Considered to be a quintessential Australian classic, Blinky Bill has made his way into our hearts and our screens.

Turtle Trackers




Wombat Warriors




