Who is Anne?



Born on June 12, 1929, Anne Frank was a German-Jewish teenager who was forced to go into hiding during the Holocaust. She and her family, along with four others, spent over two years during World War II hiding in an annex of rooms above her father's office in Amsterdam.

Since it was first published in 1947, Anne Frank's diary has become one of the most powerful memoirs of the Holocaust. Its message of courage and hope in the face of adversity has reached millions. The diary has been translated into 67 languages with over 30 million copies sold. Anne Frank's story is especially meaningful to young people today. For many she

is their first, if not their only exposure to the history of the Holocaust.

After being betrayed to the Nazis, Anne, her family, and the others living with them were arrested and deported to Nazi concentration camps. In March of 1945, seven months after she was arrested, Anne Frank died of typhus at Bergen-Belsen. She was fifteen years old.

Her bravery and legacy live on, however, and she is frequently cited as a role model for


today's youth.

Shadow Life: A Portrait of Anne Frank and Her Family by Barry Denenberg, 2005

This is the complete story of Anne Frank and her family's life, from Frankfurt, Germany, where Anne and Margot were born before the war, up to their murders at the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. When the Franks leave Frankfurt for Amsterdam, they are hoping to find a place where they can resume a normal life, but instead, the family's freedoms are taken away bit by bit.

Everyone knows about Anne Frank, and her life hidden in the secret annexe - or do they? Peter van Pels and his family are locked away in there with the Franks, and Peter sees it all differently. He's a boy, and for a boy it's just not the same. What is it like to be forced into hiding with Anne Frank, to hate her and then find yourself falling in love with her? Anne's diary ends on August 4, 1944, but Peter's story takes us on, beyond their betrayal and into the Nazi death camps. He details with accuracy, clarity and compassion, the reality of day-to-day survival in Auschwitz - and the terrible conclusion.



The Boy Who Loved Anne Frank: A Novel by Ellen Feldman, 2006


On 16 February 1944, Peter, Anne Frank's closest confidant in the Secret Annex, declared to her that if he got out alive, he would reinvent himself entirely; no one would ever know who he was or where he had been. This is the story of what might have happened if the boy in hiding had survived the horror.



This is a complete collection of Anne Frank's lesser-known writings: short stories, fables, personal reminiscences, and an unfinished novel. Here, too, are portions of the diary originally withheld from publication by her father. By turns fantastical, rebellious, touching, funny, and heartbreaking, these writings reveal the astonishing range of Anne Frank's wisdom and imagination - as well as her indomitable love of life.



Discovered in the attic in which she spent the two years of her life, Anne Frank's remarkable diary has since become a world classic - a powerful reminder of the horrors of war and an eloquent testament to the human spirit. In 1942, with Nazis occupying Holland, a thirteen-year-old Jewish girl and her family fled their home in Amsterdam and went into hiding. Cut off from the outside world, they faced hunger, boredom, the constant cruelties of living in confined quarters, and the ever-present threat of discovery and death. In her diary Anne recorded vivid impressions of her experiences during this period. Her thoughtful, moving, and amusing account offers a fascinating commentary on human courage and frailty.









Anne Frank House in Amsterdam by Marko Kassenaar and Liesbeth Heenk , 2014


One of the most popular museums in Amsterdam, the Anne Frank House, attracts over 1.2 million visitors a year. It was the hiding place during the Second World War of Anne Frank to escape deportation by the Nazis. 







Roses From the Earth: The Biography of Anne Frank by Carol Ann Lee, 1988

Anne Frank's diary is the most widely read book after the Bible, yet never before has a biography of her been published. Carol Anne Lee has been allowed access to previously unpublished documents and gives a definitive account of Anne Frank's short life before, during and after the diary.




Behind the Bookcase: Miep Gies, Anne Frank, and the Hiding Place by Barbara Lowell, 2020

Anne Frank's diary is a gift to the world because of Miep Gies. One of the protectors of the Frank family, Miep recovered the diary after the family was discovered by Nazis, and then returned it to Otto Frank after World War II. The story of their relationship--and the impending danger to the family in hiding--unfolds in this unique perspective of Anne Frank's widely known story.

Anne Frank's world-famous diary comes to an abrupt end shortly before she and her companions in the secret annex were arrested on August 4, 1944. This is the story of what happened next, how Anne became absorbed into the horror of the Nazi camp system. Through eyewitness testimony from camp survivors and historic pictures and film, the brutality and horror of Auschwitz, Sobibor, and Bergen-Belsen are revealed, and two of Anne Frank's friends remember both their school days in Amsterdam and the days before Anne's untimely death at Bergen-Belsen in March of 1945.



After Auschwitz: A story of heartbreak and survival by the stepsister of Anne Frank by Eva Schloss, 2014

Eva was arrested by the Nazis on her fifteenth birthday and sent to Auschwitz. Before the war, in Amsterdam, Eva had become friendly with a young girl called Anne Frank. Though their fates were very different, Eva's life was set to be entwined with her friend's for ever more, after her mother Fritzi married Anne's father Otto Frank in 1953. Eva's memories and descriptions are heartbreakingly clear, her account brings the horror as close as it can possibly be. But this is also an exploration of what happened next, of Eva's struggle to live with herself after the war and to continue the work of her stepfather Otto, ensuring that the legacy of Anne Frank is never forgotten.








Eva's Story: A Survivor's Tale by the Stepsister of Anne Frank by Eva Schloss, 2010

In March 1938 the Germans invaded Austria and young Eva Geiringer and her family became refugees. Like many Jews they fled to Amsterdam where they hid from the Nazis until they were betrayed and arrested in 1944. Eva was 15 years old when she was sent to Auschwitz - the same age as her friend Anne Frank. After the war her mother married Otto Frank, the only surviving member of the Frank family. 40 years later Eva has finally felt able to tell her story.




The Extraordinary Life of Anne Frank by Kate Scott and Anke Rega (Illustrator), 2019

In this beautifully written memoir, Jacqueline van Maarsen tells of her friendship with Anne Frank, depicting Anne as a typical, fun-loving girl. She also recounts her chilling Holocaust experience— escaping deportation by the Nazis; helplessly watching friends, including Anne, and family members disappear; and starting her life again after the war. Through Jacqueline's memories and black-and-white photos, Anne Frank will come to life and continue to be remembered.

Anne Frank (Little People, Big Dreams Series by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara and Sveta Dorosheva (Illustrator), 2018

Discover the life of Anne Frank, the writer whose diary captured the hearts of the public, in this true story of her life. Little Anne was born in Germany to a liberal Jewish family. But when the Nazis came into power during World War II, she was forced to go into hiding with her family in Amsterdam where she was eventually betrayed and sent to a concentration camp.



More than 350 full-colour and black-and-white photographs capture the legacy of Anne Frank on the seventy-fifth anniversary of her birth in a visual tour of the famous Amsterdam home in which Anne and her family took refuge to escape the Nazis. A full-colour visual book celebrating the legacy of Anne and her famous house. The reader experiences the house and its relics, and sees photos of Anne's family and friends, the people who helped them and the changing Amsterdam neighbourhood where they lived.
