Twins by Varian Johnson & Shannon Wright




Amulet series by Kazu Kibuishi

Click series by Kayla Miller

Olive "clicks" with everyone in the fifth grade—until one day she doesn't. With the performance drawing closer by the minute, will Olive be able to find her own place in the show before the curtain comes up?





Aster and the Accidental Magic by Thom Pico

Anaction-packed fantasy adventure about a girl, her dog, and magic gone wrong! When Aster and her dog Buzz are adventuring in the forest, they run into a trickster spirit who gives Aster three wishes. Guts by Raina Telgemeier


